Goal: All students will improve in all areas of Mathematics with an emphasis on open response in all areas, and measurement and geometry.

Priority 2: Literacy

Goal: All students will improve in all areas of Literacy with an emphasis on open response content passages, and writing content and style.

Priority 3: Wellness

Goal: Spring Hill Elementary School will encourage students to make healthy lifestyle choices by implementing strategies to decrease BMI scores and raise awareness of all stakeholders of the school community in support of healthy living.

Priority 1: To exceed the 2012-13 AMO performance level in mathematics.

Supporting
Data:

1. Over the past three years, we have seen trends in lower scores for strands in Measurement, Geometry, and Number & Operations on both MC and Open Response for the Combined Population.
2. Test scores for 2010-11 showed an increase in 2% more students scoring proficient or advanced in mathematics in grades 3-6 with 96%.
3. We will continue applying strategies to help meet our AMO goals with remediation using Math IXL, TLI, and one-on-one instruction for those showing significant deficits in math. Technology will be infused in classrooms to help build interest and take advantage of the multitude of teaching tools available for teachers.
4. K-2 will work to increase student scores on the MAT 8/ SAT 10 to get students to the 99 percentile. Currently, we have 85% scoring proficient/advanced in math. Our goal is to increase by 10% this school year.

A remediation period is scheduled during the school day for those who need extra help from an available certified teacher or a trained paraprofessional. This remediation time is scheduled to not interfere with regular classroom instruction. A certified teacher and a paraprofessional working under the direction of the teacher or the regular classroom teacher are also available for students who need point-in-time remediation. Teachers and staff have been trained in the assessment of students, and providing instruction to remediate weaknesses. Students who require an IRI or an AIP will be provided with remediation during the school day. Appropriate interventions will be made. Interventions will be aligned with scientifically-based research and will be systematic and explicit. The interventions will be provided by a highly qualified teacher or a trained paraprofessional working under the direction of the teacher. Priority 2: To meet or exceed 2012-13 AMO performance level of Literacy.

1. It has been the trend of the combined population to score lower in the strands of Practical Passage Reading in Multiple Choice and open response, Writing-Content Domain, and Writing-Style Domain in Open Response.
2. Literacy scores on the ACTAAP showed a 2% increase from the previous year.
